New Orleans to attend the General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association.

This year's GA will address the issues of white supremacy culture within the denomination and work toward a truly anti-racist future. Because we will become more true to what we want Unitarian Universalism to be, our national Association and its member congregations will grow. We were already drawing people in need of liberal religious community in the time of Trump and strengthening our interfaith connections. Right now Unitarian Universalists are modeling for others how to work for justice in the world and within our own religious institutions at the same time.

At the General Assembly, delegates will elect a new president for the Unitarian Universalist Association. All three candidates, the Reverends Susan Frederick-Gray, Alison Miller, and Jean Pupke, are highly qualified. My judgment is that the Rev. Alison Miller is the best choice to lead the UUA into a future of spiritual, ethical, and institutional growth. She has demonstrated leadership that includes and encourages individuals to grow their own souls and live fully their values and beliefs. Reflections

I'm writing to you after a moving Bridging Ceremony where we acknowledged the passage of two of our high school seniors into young adulthood, and then spending the afternoon with the whole CUC/USR Youth Group as they did their own Bridging Ceremony for the four high school seniors present in the combined Youth Group. As is so often the case, spending time with these young people gave me hope for the future, and affirmation that this faith is making a difference in the lives of our children. The care and compassion with which they treat one another - both their close friends and their vague acquaintances - is inspiring. They are models of "radical hospitality", and show up for each other in a way that many of us could learn from.

Last month I promised to share the results of a review done by the RE Committee and me of our RE program accomplishments during my time as your DRE. Unfortunately, the RE Committee meeting had to be postponed, and so what follows are my thoughts alone. I hope, however, they are still illuminating.

I began with my recent reflections on our Youth Group, because I feel that one of my biggest challenges, and indeed one of the biggest challenges I've seen across our denomination, is keeping the children who grow up in Unitarian Universalist religious education programs engaged with UU congregations through high school and on into young adulthood. I wish I could leave you with a magical solution to this problem, but the best I can do is exhort you to keep reaching out to our young people, and to form meaningful relationships with them long before they reach high school age. There are a few great built-in opportunities for this - teaching RE classes, serving as a Coming of Age mentor - and many more casual moments - coffee hour - where connections can be made. The possibility of creating true multigenerational community is one of the greatest blessings of our faith community, and we must constantly be cognizant of the thought and intentionality that the creation and maintenance of this community requires.

Overall, I am proud of the RE program that we have offered for the past two years. I am so grateful for all the wonderful and dedicated volunteers that allowed us to offer age-specific classes, January Justice Workshops, multiage holiday programming, nursery care, three levels of Our Whole Lives sexuality education programming, Coming of Age, and Youth Group.

At the end of last year in an RE Visioning Workshop, we came up with three RE needs that included helping families get to know each other better, relieving overburdened parent volunteers, and fostering more multigenerational connections. I invite you to read more about this in my Annual Report, but in short, I am proud to have made a lot of progress especially towards the first two goals with several new programs this year. Kids and families have connected at Parent's Nights Out and other non-Sunday programs, the number of parents teaching RE has fallen as others have stepped up to the plate, and I have seen the parents of young children in our program forming deep connections and creating the kind of community that will serve as a strong foundation for our RE program going forward. The future is bright!

In case you don't get to read my Annual Report - I'll close here the same way I did there. It has been an absolute pleasure to serve as your DRE for the past two years. I am grateful for all the relationships I have formed, all the valuable lessons I have learned, and the shared ministry that we have done together. I have felt valued and appreciated as a member of your staff, and have been impressed by this congregation's commitment to religious education. I will miss you all, and wish you all the best!

The Board of Trustees is pleased to announce that the USR will be sponsoring Katie Byron in her pursuit of a Fellowship as a Unitarian Minister.

Katie grew up attending the Unitarian Society of Ridgewood. She graduated from Brown University in 2015 with a double major in Computational Biology and Gender and Sexuality Studies. She is currently completing a fellowship in the Department of Bioethics at the National Institutes of Health. She is passionate about understanding the ways that identity shapes experiences of healthcare and how we can best provide spiritual and emotional support to patients and families facing difficult healthcare decisions. She will be beginning a dual MDiv/MSW program at Boston University in the fall with the eventual goal of serving as a UU hospital chaplain.

Katie shared the following statement with us:

"I have the unique honor of serving patients as an abortion doula. I accompany people before, during, and after their procedures, talking about everything from what their family thinks of their decision to what they're going to eat for lunch that day. Many of them talk about their struggles with reconciling their faith with the decision they are making. I believe it is these people that are calling me to ministry. I want to help people working to reconcile their faith with the choices they make, the things that happen to them, and the people they become. I am pursuing theological education to better understand how to sit with people contemplating how value-laden medical decisions intersect with their faith identity. I hope to continue building a vocation that embraces the divine complexities of human experience and creates spaces for nuance in our polarized political climate. My commitment to justice work that honors the full range of human experiences is part of my commitment as a Unitarian Universalist to honor the inherent worth and dignity of every person. I believe faith and spirituality provide opportunities to transcend the binaries and partisan reductions that surround these issues and create space to address deeper questions of how we create the Beloved Community in a way that acknowledge the messiness of being human."

We are honored to have the opportunity to sponsor such an impressive young woman who we can call one of our own.



gal. We are also trying to help undocumented parents of American children prepare for the possibility that they may be deported and will need to find legal guardians for children left behind. Named after the 13th constitutional amendment, which abolished slavery except as "punishment for crime," the doc uses archival footage and expert commentary to make the case that slavery hasn't disappeared from the U.S.—it's evolved into our modern system of mass incarceration, one in which many prisons are run by for-profit companies and prisoners can be paid a pittance to work for corporations.

Coming at a time when Black Lives Matter and police bias are being hotly debated, 13th was the first nonfiction film to open the prestigious NY Film Festival in its 54 years. . . "We didn't choose a documentary," NYFF's director Kent Jones said at a screening. "We chose a film that happened to be a documentary."

The 13th constitutional amendment was ratified in 1865 and stated: "Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist with-

in the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction."—Fortune magazine, 6 Oct. 2016, accessed 16 Mar. 2017 (directed by Ava DuVernay, 100 min., Not Rated)

This Society is an anti-racist congregation committed to reflecting this commitment in the life and culture of the entire organization. Adopted May, 2002.


