November 19th Plate Collection for Table to Table

Table to Table is Northeast New Jersey's first and only food rescue program. Their mission is to redistribute fresh, wholesome food which would otherwise be wasted. By operating a local fleet of refrigerated trucks they're on call to pick-up fresh food from supermarkets, caterers, corporate cafeterias, and restaurants. This food is then delivered free of charge to over 80 recipient agencies such as soup kitchens, safe houses for women and children, homeless shelters, veterans and elder care programs. Table to Table is a volunteer organization funded by corporations and personal contributions. Its fundraising and management expenses never exceed 4%, which has earned it Charity Navigator's highest rating for 7 years in a row. Thank you for supporting Table to Table on **November 19th**.

Did you know there is an **important ballot question** going before the voters on **November 7?** A YES vote on Public Question No. 2 would amend the State Constitution to ensure that money collected from polluters would be dedicated to repair, replace, or restore damaged natural resources. Many of New Jersey's polluted sites are located in communities least able to afford their own remediation programs. These communities have been shortchanged. For many years Trenton has consistently used the fines collected from polluters to plug holes in the budget and for other uses. Not only is this a matter of protection of resources it is a matter of justice for places left behind. Please take the time to vote YES on Question #2 and keep the funds locked in for their intended use, the protection and preservation of our State's fragile natural resources.

UU Outreach Auction Saturday November 4th

(5) Bergen Volunteer Medical Initiative utilizes volunteer healthcare professionals to provide free primary care for 1,100 low-income, working Bergen County residents

The Peace and Justice Committee wants to encourage you to take actions! We can make a difference, one person at a time. Michael Moore has spoken out since he was 17 years old for social justice. After attending the play by Michael Moore, we are presenting a modified:

What YOU Can Do List

1. Make the Daily Call

Go to **5Calls.org** or go to the App store and download the **5 Calls** app. All you have to do is type in your zip code and the app will pull up the names of your elected representatives, list the issues of the day and dial the number for you.

2. Make the Monthly Visit

Your member of Congress has a local office in your town or nearby. So visit both of your U.S. Senators (often the nearest federal building). Go there and ask to speak to their aide about the issues we're facing. Also don't forget to visit the local office (or the state capitol office) of your State Representatives/ Assemblyperson, and your State Senator.

3. Show up at Town Halls

There's an excellent group that formed after Trump's appointment by the Electoral College called Indivisible. Go to <u>www.indivisibleguide.com</u> and type in your zip code to find all the latest local action you can take near your home. This includes details on when and where your local reps will be holding town halls.

4. The Electoral College Must Go

The Electoral College was specifically designed to protect slavery. It is antiquated, racist, and undemocratic. Twice in the last 17 years, the candidate that the majority of our fellow citizens chose to be President was denied the White House. It is time to get rid of it. Fortunately, there's a momentum building behind the **National Popular Vote** interstate compact. This bill will guarantee the Presidency to the candidate who receives the most popular votes in all 50 states and the District of Columbia. It has been enacted into law in 11 states with 165 electoral votes. This interstate compact will take effect when enacted by states with 105 more electoral votes. It has passed at least one house in 12 additional states with 96 electoral votes and been approved unanimously by committee votes in two additional states with 27 electoral votes. Please visit **NationalPopularVote.com** and help get rid of the Electoral College.

5. YOU Must Run for Office

I know this is the last thing you want to do. But if we keep leaving the job to the distant, lame, pathetic, political hacks who have sold us down the river, then what right do we have to complain? This is the only way it can get fixed—when you and I decide to put in our time—even if it is a brief time, and run for of-fice. We need good candidates for 2018 elections, and not just Congress and State Houses, but also school boards, city councils, and county commissions. Why not take out a petition today and run next year.

6. YOU MUST BECOME THE MEDIA

Stop Complaining about the media, stop wishing they were something they're not, find the ones who are doing a good job and then start your own media network by sharing their work and your work on the internet. Use Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and other social media sites to spread the news and information. Make sure all your friends and family are signed up. You can do this!

NJSC Searching for New Host Family for Young Female

A 17-year old Mexican female, currently held as an unaccompanied minor by KidsPeace in Bethlehem, PA, will be turning 18 on November 18, 2017 and will be sent by ICE to an adult detention center if alternative housing cannot be found for her by that date. She was forcefully sent here by her mother for her own protection in September 2016, after they had been attacked by the Narcos Drug gang. She speaks Spanish and conversational English, and is in the 11th grade. Her lawyer hopes she will obtain Special Immigrant Juvenile Status soon, and her pending asylum case will be handled at the Newark Asylum office, probably in 3-6 months. A. enjoys school, wants to go to college, would like to work, and enjoys dancing (she was a competitive dancer in Mexico), drawing and ceramics. She likes animals and has no known medical issues. The Northern New Jersey Sanctuary Coalition would like to find a family to host her under our auspices (with our financial/caseworker help). 
