From the Interim Minister's Mailbox

The name of the ninth month of the year, September, comes to us from Latin via Old English. It means "seven." In the Roman calendar, this month was the seventh of year, March being the first. However, with the adoption of the Julian calendar (and perhaps earlier), January was the first month and September the ninth. In the ancient calendars, the New Year began in March. Now it begins in January.

Now it is in September, however, that many religious and academic institutions and other organizations begin their new year. And in the Jewish calendar, the New Year begins on Rosh Hashanah. This year it begins at sunset on October 2<sup>nd</sup>, although it often occurs during September.

The Unitarian Universalist tradition is to commence the new congregational year on the first Sunday following Labor Day and shift to a lighter summer schedule forty weeks later.

So here we are, at the start of a new year in the life of the Unitarian Society of Ridgewood. After the lighter schedule of summer programs, the summer school vacation, travels for many, and periods of relaxation for most, it is time to begin again.

I will be back in the pulpit on the Sunday of Labor Day weekend. The following Sunday, September 11<sup>th</sup>, will be the ingathering service for all ages and water ritual. Please bring water to share. Religious education classes will resume on September 18<sup>th</sup>. The youth group will have already resumed meeting in August and other groups will quickly get up to speed in September.

It is good to gather together and make the most of our gathering:

May we work together to make the most of this new year of community, spiritual growth, deeper understanding, and action for a better world.

May the ties of community grow stronger and deeper across the generations.

May each individual in this community grow in spirit.

May each one understand more deeply all that matters.

Reflections

The countdown to the start of the church year has begun! It has been a busy month preparing the religious education program, and I am so excited to pilot a few new programs this year, beginning with the Blessing of the Backpacks on Thursday, September 1, at 6:45pm. I hope to see you, your kids, and their backpacks there! We will have a short ceremony followed by food and fellowship.

As some of you may know, your Ministerial Search Committee (MSC) has also been hard at work throughout the summer - and they need your input! It is especially important that the voices of RE parents are heard in this process. To ensure your voices are heard, the MSC and I have collaborated to offer two Cottage Meetings especially for RE Parents. The first will be on Friday, **September 16**, from 6:30pm-8pm. Childcare will be offered from 6:30pm-9:30pm, allowing parents the opportunity to go out for dinner on their own after the meeting. This is a sample of our pilot "Parents' Nights Out" program, scheduled for November 4, February 3, and May 5. The second will be on Sunday, **September 18** from 11:30am-1:30pm, and I will lead a concurrent Kids' Cottage Meeting. Keep an eye out for an online signup in September's eblasts to sign up for either meeting.

September seems to me to offer even more chances for new beginnings than January. This is especially true for folks who are starting a new school year (children or adults!), or those whose jobs follow a traditional academic calendar. I remember in college I would often make "new school year" resolutions at the start of each year - don't procrastinate, speak up more in class, and be more socially engaged are a few I remember. Why not set intentions for the new church year as well? While I know how busy life gets, and that sports and school commitments don't even cease on Sunday, your child can only have an excellent religious education experience if they attend as frequently as possible. In her book The Gift of Faith: Tending the Spiritual Lives of Children (an excellent, quick read that I highly recommend), Jeanne Nieuwejaar quotes the Rabbi Moshe Waldoks:

I often go out to groups and say, `How many want your kids to be professional soccer players?' Of course, nobody raises their hand," says Waldoks. "Then I say, `How many want them to be Jews at the end of the century?' Oh! Everyone raises their hand. So where's the investment? You're investing in soccer and you want your kids to be Jews?

Of course, it's not quite as straightforward for us. Maybe some of you do want your kids to be professional soccer players, and I imagine that many of you would be hesitant to say you want your kids to be Unitarian Universalists - we are loathe to impose our religion on anyone. And that's ok! I do believe, though, that we all want our children to engage in a free and responsible search for truth and meaning, and our religious education program is designed to give them the tools to do so. With regular attendance, our kids will not only be better equipped for this search, but they will feel more at home at church, forge stronger friendships with their church peers, and have more opportunities for intergenerational connection with other congregants. Make your intentions simple: come to church! If you haven't already done so, registering your child is a great first step - you can do so here. You can also make sure all the important RE events of the year are on your family calendar using our RE QuickCal See you at church!

Several of the Racial Justice subcommittee's programs this Fall will focus on America's criminal justice system.

1. Legislation is pending in the New Jersey Assembly to limit the use of solitary confinement in the state's prisons. The Montclair Unitarian congregation has created a **life-size replica of a solitary cell**. We have arranged to borrow it **starting Friday September 9.** It will be on our front patio and **open for public viewing on Sundays and on a schedule** that will be posted on the cell. Members of our congregation have volunteered to staff its open hours. Plan to check it out.

And we will have letters asking our local members of the Assembly to vote for these morally essential changes in New Jersey's penal practices for you to sign at the Action Table Sunday, September 18. It has already been passed 23-16 by the NJ Senate.

- 2. Come to the **discussion of "Just Mercy"**, the award-winning memoir by Bryan Stevenson on **Friday evening**, **September 23 at 7 p.m.** He tells of his work representing people who are impoverished or black or both on death row. We are very fortunate to have Louis Acevedo, Deputy Public Defender in Bergen County as the discussion leader.
- 3. Save the Date: We will have a chance to see a **new documentary**, **'Profiled''**, and hear its producer and director, Kathleen Foster, discuss the film on **Friday**, **November 4**.

Breaking News: There will be a press conference on Saturday, 9/10 at 10:30 a.m. on the USR patio. Assembly-woman Shavonda Sumter will address the bill she is sponsoring that will restrict use of solitary confinement in correctional facilities. All welcome.

## Plate Collection Report (2015-2016)

In 2009, the USR Board granted the Social Responsibilities Council (SRC) approval to use the Offertory Collection at Sunday services to collect money for social justice causes, as determined by the SRC. In 2014, the Board asked the SRC to increase the number of collections to up to 15 per year, allowing for emergency requests. During the 2015-2016 congregational year there were 14 plate collections. The congregation responded generously for a total of \$14,080. A big and sincere thank you to all who have contributed!!

#### Don't get TRAPPED into thinking TRAP laws are in the past.

The Reproductive Justice Committee is still celebrating the Supreme Court's decision in the Whole Women's Health vs. Hellerstedt case solidifying that Texas women face undue burden as a result of the TRAP laws enacted upon clinics in the Lone Star state.

For those of you feeling fuzzy on the acronyms, TRAP = Targeted Regulation of Abortion Providers. They are laws that single out the medical practices of doctors who provide abortions and impose on them requirements that are different and more burdensome than those imposed on other medical practices. (Thanks for the definition, <u>Center for Reproductive Rights.</u>)

The documentary **TRAPPED by Dawn Porter** serves as a TRAP Law 101 course as it delves into the dangerous impact that TRAP laws have on the people and communities of the clinics they regulate. While the documentary focuses on the time leading up to the Supreme Court decision, the victorious outcome of the case does not overshadow the importance of understanding that TRAP laws continue to hinder access to choice for huge populations of people nationwide. **This documentary is essential viewing.** 



(Spoiler alert: No breaks in sight. Keep moving forward.) Doors open at 7:00 pm, movie begins at 7:20 pm, and Ms. Baden will speak following the movie.


