

Dear Friends,

With all that has been going on in the world, I hope you have been able to take some time to be with friends and family as the summer begins to end and we move closer to new beginnings — children back at school, the start of the new church year and new relationships, the coming of cooler weather and the fall.

My family and I are spending this last bit of August on Cape Cod, where I spent time as a child each summer. I'm taking my children to the same gocarts, the same mini-golf courses, the same restaurants and beaches, the same town transfer center to recycle and donate. But of course we are also doing a lot differently, like trying new playgrounds, and shopping at new grocery stores. There is something strange and wonderful about long-time continuity, and there's good reason not to mess with things that are working, when they are truly working. But there's also something wonderful about trying new things and changing up our routine.

This fall, and probably well into winter, it will be part of my job to watch, ask questions, and learn. Learn about you, about this congregation, about "how things are done" and to begin to figure out, with you and your leadership, what has been working, and what hasn't. Where are the places a shake up would be welcome and feel exciting, what areas of congregational life feel sacred? And then, with that information, work alongside you to decide if and when change should come to aspects that long for it and aspects that don't. We won't move fast, except where necessary, and we won't make change without forethought, conversation, and awareness wherever possible.

The one place you can expect to see change is in the Sunday morning experience, what many of us call worship. There, ministers are granted what is called, "freedom of the pulpit". This means that from our pulpits, and really throughout the Sunday morning service, we are empowered to say and do what we believe needs to be said and done. This doesn't mean that we say or do absolutely anything: we are trusted to speak and behave in accordance with the needs we perceive in our community and to speak and behave in ways that our communities will understand us and in ways that will move our people.

So, starting with the very first service, you will see some changes. In the order of service, in some of the elements. But please know that you won't suddenly have no sermon, or have communion, or be expected to recite a rote prayer each Sunday. We will be experimenting, and looking for feedback, all while reminding ourselves that what works for some may not work for others, and that is a part of the beauty and challenge of a Unitarian Universalist Congregation. We are going to laugh, and sing, and think, and enjoy our Sunday mornings as best we can, using them as a time to practice all the best of our UU values of openess, welcoming, head, heart, curiosity and kindness. On Sunday it may feel like change comes quickly, but promise it will be thoughtful change, not change for change's sake.

It's wonderful to have some things that never change. But it's also good to try new things now and again, to see if change can make us even more deeply connected. To build new memories. Create new ways.

We are starting a journey together this September, one that requires patience and trust. We will have to simultaneously take our time building that trust and taking an immediate leap in some areas. I know we can do it, as long as we are open and honest and compassionate with one another from the start.

May the end of your summer bring something old and familiar, and something new and different. I will see you all soon for our Ingathering Service on September 10. If you are so inclined, bring some water to share for our Water Ceremony.

SRC Action Table

On the Sunday after the Charlottesville Neo-Nazi and white supremacist demonstrations, counter demonstrations, the killing of a young woman anti-demonstrator and the president's statements, 36 congregants signed the letter at the Action table that was sponsored by the Social Responsibilities Council. The letter, which expressed the concern and dismay at the lack of presidential moral leadership in the aftermath of these events, was sent to President Trump with copies sent to Congressman Paul Ryan, Congresswoman Nancy Pelosi, Senator Mitch McConnell, Senator Chuck Schumer, Senator Cory Booker and Senator Bob Menendez. Plate Collection Report (2016-2017)

In 2009, the USR Board granted the Social Responsibilities Council (SRC) approval to use the Offertory Collection at Sunday services to collect money for social justice causes, as determined by the SRC. In 2014, the Board asked the SRC to increase the number of collections to up to 15 per year, allowing for emergency requests. During the 2016-2017 congregational year there were 13 plate collections. The congregation responded generously for a total of \$14,962. A big and sincere thank you to all who have contributed!!

Plate Collection Announcement for September 2017

Each month The Social Responsibilities Council sponsors one plate collection per month dedicated to a social justice cause. The collection for September will be for the New Jersey Abortion Access Fund. The New Jersey Abortion Access Fund is a volunteer-run 501(c)(3) organization that provides financial assistance to those seeking safe, legal abortions. NJAAF provides grants to help cover the cost of an abortion or related services. This fund was initiated by the USR Reproductive Justice Committee with the assistance of 2 grants from the USR Endowment Fund. Currently Carol Loscalzo, is President of NJAAF.

The New Jersey Abortion Access Fund envisions a world where equal access to abortion is guaranteed for all women, regardless of race, sexual orientation, gender expression, ethnicity, age, class, immigration status and ability. The hostile climate surrounding reproductive rights, especially in recent months, has created even greater obstacles for women as they make intimate decisions about their reproductive rights. USR has responded very generously in the past. NJAAF is very grateful for your past donations, and we thank you for your continued support.

<u>Reproductive Justice Committee – All Welcome</u>


The Reproductive Justice Committee has scheduled its first meeting of the 2017-18 year on Sunday **September 17** at 11:30 a.m. after the service in the Reeb conference room. We invite anybody with an interest in "Repro Justice" to join us. Due to the current national climate, this year we will continue to focus on preventing the further erosion of reproductive rights, including ensuring access to safe abortion care (maintaining the physical and emotional safety of women, their partners and clinic staff inside and outside the facilities), the increasing maternal death rates in the United States (in particular the astonishingly high rate of maternal deaths in communities of color), and issues related to the rights and dignity of incarcerated women in NJ.

The first event of the year will be on Thursday, **October 26** and is co-sponsored with several organizations including Northern NJ NOW. We will be showing "EQUAL MEANS EQUAL", an unflinching look at how women are treated in the U.S. today. Click <u>here</u> to view flyer.
