From the Minister's Mailbox

This past year was tough in many ways, for many of us. Beyond any concept of partisanship, many of us have seen things happening on the national stage, in our

government, in our local politics, in our society, in our schools, everywhere, that we find disheartening. We have seen things that make us question the moral fiber of this nation, that make us long for the ideals that America has never quite yet lived up to. This year has brought concern, anxiety, fear and worry to the fore-front for many of us. We have kept working, objecting, marching and writing and talking.

The challenge of this past year and the hope that this will be better than the last is what makes me so proud of the social justice RE unit that USR engages in in January. For me, this seems like a way to say to the world, to our children, to each other: we can do more than hope, we can start the year with the right intentions. We can do more than believe, we can work, from day 1 of this new year, to make this year better than the last.

I know we can't control things — not big national things and not the tragedies that befall us in our own lives. But we can determine that we will not be passive recipients of what the future holds but active participants in our lives.

And so I invite you, when you consider making resolutions, to consider that you might make on taking into account the full desire that this year be better than the last. And perhaps consider making one each on three levels:

What can I do, consistently over the year, to make my own life better?

What can I do, consistently over the year, to help my immediate community (family, congregation, town) have a better year?

What can I do, consistently over the year, to make 2018 a better year in the wider world?

You'll notice I said, "consistently over the year". I say this because it isn't enough to do one thing in January. When we commit to a better year, we are committing to the whole of that year. It's not easy, but that's what commitment is, a long-term, difficult endeavor the fruits of which are well worth it.


